


- √ 2.2 million passengers

- \checkmark 20% have a disability, dependent on others for mobility






Monterey-Salinas Transit in 2023 WHERE RIDERS GO








Why Riders Use Transit








A Day Without Transit









Salinas 2023 Ridership

January 1, 2023 – September 30, 2023




- Salinas ridership:
 - ▶ **FIXED ROUTE**: 654,220 or 2,396 passenger boardings/day
 - ▶ **RIDES**: 58,402 or 160 passengers/day
- Highest monthly ridership compared to all jurisdictions
- 1% of residents take public transit to work
- 99% of residents are within ½ mile of transit
- Top most frequented bus stops:
 - 1. Salinas Transit Center: 870 people/day board and 911 people/day alight
 - 2. Northridge Mall: 136 people/day board and 126 people/day alight
 - 3. Harden/East Entrance to Shopping Center: 62 people/day board and 61 people/day alight




Community Survey of 409 residents who don't use transit:

- 95% of residents feel that MST's services are valuable to the community
- > 87% of residents think it's important for the entire County to support and fund improved public transportation
- 83% of residents think there should be greater levels of funding for transit over the next 5 years
- > 70% of residents are familiar with the services provided by MST



FY 2024 Budget - \$58M


Revenue By Source

Expenses by Category






MST Measure Q

- First county-wide sales tax for transportation to pass
- ▶ November 2014 won with 72.6% overall voter support
- ▶ 15-Year, 1/8 of one-percent retail sales tax
- Est. dollars raised over the life of the tax: \$100 Million (2012 \$)
- 100% of funds go to MST supporting services for veterans, seniors and persons with disabilities including:
 - ✓ MST RIDES ADA Services
 - ✓ Senior Shuttle Routes
 - Taxi Vouchers
 - Travel Training, Navigator Volunteers
 - ✓ Travel Reimbursement Incentive Program



Transportation Agency for Monterey County Measure X

- Second county-wide sales tax for transportation
- November 2016 won with 67.7% overall voter support
- 30-Year, 3/8 of one-percent sales tax
- Est. dollars raised over the life of the tax: \$600 Million (2015 \$)
- Funding distribution:
 - 60% for local streets and roads for Cities and County
 - 27% regional road safety and congestion projects
 - 13% for pedestrian and bicycle safety and mobility projects
- Approx. 7% to MST for Hwy 1 rapid bus corridor, Salinas Valley transit centers

- Nationally Recognized COVID Response and Recovery
- New South County Operations and Maintenance facility in King City, fall 2021
- University and College Transit Pass Partnerships
- Contactless Credit/Debit/eWallet Fare Payment and Capping
- Subsidized Vanpool Program
- Better Bus Network





MST Contactless Fare Payment

- First project in the State, in the Country, and in a Small Urban/Rural Area
- Daily/Weekly/MonthlyFare Capping
- First in the world to synch discount with a Government-issued ID
- Cards available to those without a bank account or credit card
- 95,000 contactless trips made to date


















- ✓ Service location:
 - 40% Monterey-Seaside
 - 40% Greater Salinas
 - 20% Regional
- ✓ Focus on high demand, high need areas
- ✓ More direct routes
- ✓ Avg. 30 min. decrease in travel time
- ✓ 20% increase in residents and jobs near service with 30 min. frequency or better
- ✓ Lower fares (\$2/2 hours)
- ✓ Subsidized vanpools

MST Major Projects

- SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit, \$77M
- Salinas Operations and Maintenance Facilities, \$25M
- Salinas Alisal Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) and Transit Center Study, \$500K
- ▶ 100% Zero-Emissions Fleet Rollout, \$100M
- Battery Electric and Fuel Cell Infrastructure, \$20M

- Restoration of local economy and employee recruitment
- Coach operator shortage
- Federal government dysfunction, ongoing
- Zero-emissions bus regulations, workforce development
- ► Land use decisions TOD Planning Study, bus stops
- Changing demographics of region
- ▶ SB 125 challenge
