Coordinated efforts such as Safe Routes to School initiatives, Vision Zero campaigns, and working with community based organizations are highly encouraged to prevent fatalities and injuries of vulnerable non-motorized road users.

1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The City of Salinas is the county seat and largest city of Monterey County. The city's 2015 population, 157,380, is 75% Hispanic, 15% White, 7% Asian, and 3% other races or more than one race. The residents are younger on average, than Californians and the U.S. population, with 32% under the age of 18 and a median age of 29. Salinas residents have large families and 66% speak a language other than English at home. Nearly 20% of the families are below the poverty level.

Salinas and much of Monterey County have experienced a high rate of violent crime in recent years, primarily due to gangs and gang-related activity. Most alarming is the rapid rise in homicide. Monterey County was identified as “the most dangerous county in California” in 2009, 2010, 2012, and 2013 for young people aged 10 to 24 by the Violence Policy Center. In 2013, Monterey County’s homicide victimization rate for residents aged 10 to 24 was 23.48 per 100,000 population, followed by Madera, San Francisco, and Alameda Counties.

Salinas has a high rate of vehicle collisions annually, with a large number involving pedestrians and bicyclists. In January-December 2018, there were 1228 collisions with nearly half of them, 594, involving injuries and ten of them with fatalities; 11 people were killed and 817 were injured. Pedestrians accounted for five (45%) of the fatalities.

The number of collisions jumped 42% from 2017 to 2018, from 862 collisions in 2017 to 1228 the following year. Salinas’s population places it at the smaller end of the 58 cities in its OTS Rankings grouping. In 2016, it ranked 44th in collisions involving pedestrians and 49th in collisions involving pedestrians under 15. Salinas ranked 36th in collisions involving bicyclists and 26th in collisions involving bicyclists under 15.

In the three years of 2016-2018, 18 pedestrians were killed by vehicles and three of them were under 18. 237 pedestrians were injured, with 42 under 18. In February 2018, two elementary-aged siblings were hit by a pickup truck while crossing the street in a crosswalk during the morning commute window. Also in 2016-2018, there was one adult bicyclist killed in a bike-vehicle crash. There were 115 bicyclists injured in collisions with vehicles, seven of them youth under 18. These data are presented in the attached Traffic Data Summary.

These data show Salinas has a serious traffic safety problem that greatly affects children and youth. Residents may not fully understand traffic laws as they pertain to bikes and pedestrians, and language and cultural differences exacerbate this problem.

The Salinas Police Department (SPD) works with the community, schools, and many organizations to promote safety issues around pedestrians and bicycles. Every year SPD participates in Ciclovía Salinas to promote safety on our streets. Ciclovía, a Spanish term for “bike path,” aims to provide a safe and inclusive place for families to come together to enjoy accessible recreation, including biking, walking, running, skating, and many other activities. SPD regularly promotes safe routes to school, pedestrian safety, and bike safety through neighborhood watch groups, community block parties, National Night Out, and presentations at our local schools. School Resource Officers in the Santa Rita School District diligently work on pedestrian and bike safety during the morning drop-off and after-school pick-up times.

Salinas has great potential for walking and biking, and children and youth need education and support to do so safely. Salinas has a year-round climate that is mild and ideal for biking and walking. Most schools are situated in or near high density neighborhoods and within one to two miles of their students’ homes.

To reduce the number of injuries and deaths of pedestrians and bicyclists due to traffic collisions, the Salinas Police Department will contract with EcologyAction to bring pedestrian and bicycle safety events to the pedestrians and bicyclists of Salinas, both youth and adults. The Walk Smart and Bike Smart programs are modeled on best national practices in terms of age of delivery, diversity of teaching methods, course content, and use of bilingual/bicultural staff. Students are taught the rules of the road as well as benefits to walking and biking.

In order to support a high percentage of walking/biking and have safer outcomes, we will reach a third of all 2nd graders in the City of Salinas with pedestrian safety education and practice, and a third of all 5th graders with bike safety education and practice. This is a major step forward, as the Transportation Agency for Monterey County

(TAMC) is committed to reaching every 2nd and 5th grader in the county annually. Currently there is no formal mechanism to teach students the basics in traffic safety. The proposed Family Fun Event will make a concerted effort to reach adults and particularly migrant parents.

11. Reduce the number of bicyclists under age 15 killed in traffic collisions.
12. Reduce the number of bicyclists under age 15 injured in traffic collisions.
13. Increase bicycle helmet usage.

3. METHOD OF PROCEDURE

A. Phase 1 – Program Preparation (1st Quarter of Grant Year)

- Develop operational plans to implement the “best practice” strategies outlined in the objectives section.
- Conduct all training needed to implement the program.
- Purchase all grant related supplies and materials needed to implement the program.
- Obtain approval of subcontractor.

- Execute subcontract.
- Schedule Walk Smart and Bike Smart events.
- Conduct pre-grant activities bicycle helmet usage survey.

Media Requirements

- Issue a press release announcing the kick-off of the grant by November 15, but no earlier than October 1. If unable to meet the November 15 date, communicate reasons to your OTS Coordinator. The kick-off press releases and any related media advisories, alerts, and materials must be emailed for approval to the OTS Public Information Officer at pio@ots.ca.gov, and copied to your OTS Coordinator, 14 days prior to the issuance date of the release.

B. Phase 2 – Program Operations (Throughout Grant Year)

- Conduct safety presentations, pedestrian safety walks, and bicycle rodeos.
- Conduct Walk Smart and Bike Smart events.
- Distribute bicycle helmets and other bicycle safety equipment.

Media Requirements

- Send all grant-related activity press releases, media advisories, alerts and general public materials to the OTS Public Information Officer (PIO) at pio@ots.ca.gov, with a copy to your OTS Coordinator. The following requirements are for grant-related activities and are different from those regarding any grant kick-off release or announcement.
 - If an OTS-supplied, template-based press release is used, there is no need for pre-approval, however, the OTS PIO and Coordinator should be copied when at the same time as the release is distributed to the press.
 - If an OTS-supplied template is not used, or is substantially changed, a draft press release shall be sent to the OTS PIO for approval. Optimum lead-time would be 10 days prior to the release distribution date, but should be no less than 5 working days prior to the release distribution date.
 - Press releases reporting the immediate and time-valued results of grant activities such as enforcement operations are exempt from the recommended advance approval process, but still should be copied to the OTS PIO and Coordinator when the release is distributed to the press.
 - Activities such as warrant or probation sweeps and court stings that could be compromised by advanced publicity are exempt from pre-publicity, but are encouraged to offer embargoed media coverage and to report the results.
- Use the following standard language in all press, media, and printed materials: Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- Email the OTS PIO at pio@ots.ca.gov and copy your OTS Coordinator at least 30 days in advance, a short description of any significant grant-related traffic safety event or program so OTS has sufficient notice to arrange for attendance and/or participation in the event.
- Submit a draft or rough-cut of all printed or recorded material (brochures, posters, scripts, artwork, trailer graphics, etc.) to the OTS PIO at pio@ots.ca.gov and copy your OTS Coordinator for approval 14 days prior to the production or duplication.
- Space permitting, include the OTS logo, on grant-funded print materials; consult your OTS Coordinator for specifics and format-appropriate logos.
- Contact the OTS PIO or your OTS Coordinator, sufficiently far enough in advance of need, for consultation when deviation from any of the above requirements might be contemplated.

C. Phase 3 – Data Collection & Reporting (Throughout Grant Year)

- Invoice Claims (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)
- Quarterly Performance Reports (due January 30, April 30, July 30, and October 30)
 - Collect and report quarterly, appropriate data that supports the progress of goals and objectives.
 - Provide a brief list of activity conducted, procurement of grant-funded items, and significant media activities. Include status of grant-funded personnel, status of contracts, challenges, or special accomplishments.
 - Provide a brief summary of quarterly accomplishments and explanations for objectives not completed or plans for upcoming activities.
 - Collect, analyze and report statistical data relating to the grant goals and objectives.

4. METHOD OF EVALUATION

Using the data compiled during the grant, the Grant Director will complete the “Final Evaluation” section in the fourth/final Quarterly Performance Report (QPR). The Final Evaluation should provide a brief summary of the grant’s accomplishments, challenges and significant activities. This narrative should also include whether goals and objectives were met, exceeded, or an explanation of why objectives were not completed.

5. ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT

This program has full administrative support, and every effort will be made to continue the grant activities after grant conclusion.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

All subrecipient law enforcement agencies shall comply with California law regarding profiling. Penal Code section 13519.4, subdivision (e), defines “racial profiling” as the “practice of detaining a suspect based on a broad set of criteria which casts suspicion on an entire class of people without any individualized suspicion of the particular person being stopped.” Then, subdivision (f) of that section goes on to provide, “A law enforcement officer shall not engage in racial profiling.”
