Attachment 2: Regulations

- 1. Food trucks must maintain a minimum distance of 200-ft from any school.
- 2. Food trucks must maintain a minimum distance of 200-ft from another food truck.
- 3. Food trucks cannot operate on High Collision Corridors as defined by the Vision Zero Plan.
- 4. Food trucks cannot operate within 200-ft of a High Collision Intersection as defined by the Vision Zero Plan.
- 5. Food trucks cannot operate in residential neighborhoods.
- 6. Food trucks must maintain a minimum distance of 40-ft from any street intersection and 20-ft from a driveway.
- 7. Food trucks cannot operate from specially marks curbs.
- 8. Food trucks, in the right of way, must operate only paved roadways and adjacent to paved sidewalks or paths.
- 9. Food trucks may not impede the flow of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Finally, an increase in food trucks in the right of way may have additional impacts to the health and comfort of the community. For this reason, the following restrictions are proposed:

- 1. Only food may be sold from food trucks.
- 2. No furniture or other fixtures may be used by a food truck.
- 3. Food trucks may not obstruct routine street sweeping.
- 4. Food trucks must provide trash and recycling receptacles.
- 5. Food trucks may not operate from defective, unsafe or unsanitary vehicles.
- 6. Food trucks may not be stored in the right of way or any city facility.
- 7. Food trucks may not be left unattended for more than 30 minutes.
- 8. Food trucks with generators may not exceed 55 decibels when selling adjacent to parks or 70 decibels when selling in the right of way.
- 9. Food trucks must adhere to the conditions and appearance requirements of the vehicle and the site (Section 20-16.150).
